

Music was always part of church life, and in the eighteenth century the village choir was famous ... some said infamous! The Ferry village the church supported also had its own maritime culture creating new folk songs about life Pear Tree and Woolston. We are delighted to welcome three groups who will be entertaining us:

MILITARY ENCAMPMENT—SOUTH EAST GREEN

In the eighteenth century the green was often used by troops camped there, practising their drills in readiness for fighting Napoleon we are delighted that the Cameron Highlanders are recreating the experience. Drill parades on the North Green 12 noon and 2.45pm.

See a display of a Napoleonic Surgeons equipment, a small medical operation. The soldiers will perform some musket and marching drill, and will do a "live" musket demonstration. The camp "ladies" will talk about day-to-day life for them in the camp.

PAGEANT VIGNETTES – JANE AUSTEN BENCH, WEST GATE

In the late 19th and early 20th century pageants were incredibly popular, often organised by local clergy and performed around parish churches, Pear Tree was no exception. We are were not able to create a full pageant but The Sarah Siddons Fan Club Theatre will perform scenes based on original pageant material plus some additions from themselves.

- 11.05 am Planting of the Pear Tree Elizabeth I.
- 11.30 am 1620 pilgrims meet Captain Richard Smith & Lancelot Andrews.
- 12.30 pm The most famous non occupant of Pear Tree churchyard the story of Richard Parker.
- 1.30 pm The most famous visitor to Pear Tree Jane Austen meets Mrs. Lewin promoter of smallpox inoculation.
- 2.30 pm Turkey Slaves & Georgian Weddings.
- 3.30 pm Pageant Parade Led by Rev Miles & Rev Davies with 79th Cameron Highlanders Regiment, The Sarah Siddons Fan Club and the Madding Crowd.

CHURCH HALL 11am—3pm

Delicious cakes and cups of tea available. Watch a collection of films made for the projects running throughout the day, and an exhibition from the Quilters.

Why Remember Peartree? – overview of church history.

The Rosoman Memorial – the Grade II listed memorial restored as part of the project.

Pear Tree War Memorial – the memorial was restored as part of the project.

The Natural Environment of the Pear Tree Churchyard – an insight into the flora and fauna found in the churchyard, which was also consecrated in 1620.

The Sad Tale of Richard Parker – the tragic story of the local cabin boy from Pear Tree.

PARADE – 3.30pm WEST GATE

The village was renowned for its annual procession, originally a medieval festival to commemorate St Peter, the patron saint of fishermen, but by the nineteenth century it was a more raucous event known as the 'Big Fisherman' we bring our Fayre to a close by recreating the procession.


REGENCY TEA - CHURCH HALL 4PM - PLACES MUST BE PRE-BOOKED
