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### REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2022

The trustees present their report with the financial statements of the charity for the year ended 31 December 2022. The trustees have adopted the provisions of Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019).

### **OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES**

#### Objectives, activities and achievements

The objectives of the Hampshire Genealogical Society (HGS), as set out in the Constitution, are to advance the education of the public in the study of genealogy/family history, with particular reference to Hampshire. In furtherance of this the Society:

- a) Promotes the study of family history and provides information and education services to facilitate this
- b) Holds lectures, meetings and discussions on subjects relating to the study of family history, and in Hampshire in particular.
- Collects, publishes, co-ordinates and makes accessible, in the interest of genealogy, documents or c) records relevant to family history in the county of Hampshire.

The main activities and achievements during the year were:

- Group meetings and governance meetings have been maintained throughout the year using a mix of in I) person and zoom meetings.
- Manning a successful help desk at Hampshire Record Office (HRO) providing assistance to research II) family history. We have now expanded the days we offer this assistance.
- III) Maintaining the successful Partnership with the HRO and continuing to hold monthly meetings to monitor the Partnership.
- IV) Providing ten Area Group monthly meetings in locations throughout Hampshire. The National and International Groups continue to meet regularly via Zoom.
- Liaison with local libraries to provide a family history help service.
- VI) Publication of a quarterly journal 'The Hampshire Family Historian'.
- VII) Running a successful website for the Society at www.hgs-familyhistory.com.
- VIII) Successful Conference Day and AGM held at Botley Park Hotel in 2022.
- IX) Participation in 'virtual' and in person Family History fairs that has generated revenue and new members.
- X) XI) Participation in meetings with the Family History Federation.
- Baptism, marriage and burial CDs, also Memorial Inscription CDs produced for resale.
- XII) 115th and final edition in the Village Booklet series which are produced either as hard copies or as PDF
- XIII) Increase of online sales of CDs and also membership via PayPal and Stripe.
- XIV) HGS stock continuing to be sold through Parish Chest.
- XV) Continuing requests via the website to the Research Centre by non-members and members for help with research and general enquiries.
- XVI) Additional datasets such as 'Britons Dying Overseas' being made available in the Members' Area on
- Memorial Inscriptions throughout the county are being updated with a master index. XVII)
- XVIII) The Media sub-committee continues to meet.
- XIX) The Facebook presence continues to provide publicity for the Society along with media broadcasts on

# REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2022

#### **OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES**

#### Public benefit

The aim of the Society to promote the study of family history encourages education in the pursuit of such study. Its research activities are made available to the public at public reference sites, such as the Hampshire Record Office. The website is open to the general public and they can get help with their research via this medium, the HGS Research Centre answering their queries.

Any person or organisation interested in family history can become a member of the Society without restriction, on payment of a modest annual subscription. In addition, members of the public are able to visit the Society's Research Room where they will be given help and advice on their research. Subscribers receive a copy of the quarterly journal 'The Hampshire Family Historian', which is now available electronically.

The Society publishes the results of its research in the form of booklets, CDs and PDF format which are available at a relatively modest cost.

The Trustees confirm that they have referred to the guidance contained in the Charity Commission's general guidance on public benefit when reviewing the charity's aims and objectives and in planning future activities. The Trustees refer to public benefit throughout this report.

# REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2022

#### **FINANCIAL REVIEW**

The Society's income is derived from three main sources: membership subscriptions, sales of books & CDs and royalties. Income through membership subscriptions totalled £27,600 (2021: £28,122). There were 1,812 members in the year ended 31 December 2022 (2021: 1,856). Income from sales of books & CDs totalled £4,666 (2021: £7,137). Income from royalties totalled £6,867 (2021: £6,297). No further costs were incurred in the move from Cosham to Winchester following the cessation of the lease in 2021 (2021: £13,518). During 2022 the Society was notified of a bequest. The sum of £35,714 has been included as income and a debtor in these financial statements and the monies were subsequently received in early 2023.

Overall the charity produced a profit of £40,459 (2021: loss £4,055) on income from all sources of £77,348 (2021: £46,245).

### Reserves policy

The Society aims to maintain reserves equivalent to twelve months core revenue costs. This reserve would enable the Society to cover its commitments and continue until either alternative funding could be found or liabilities settled upon cessation. The current revenue costs amount to approximately £37,000. Total funds as at 31 December 2022 were £118,729.

#### PLANS FOR THE FUTURE

We will continue to merge our AGM with a Conference Day in 2023 at the Littleton Hall, Winchester.

We require a Projects Co-ordinator who can motivate and organise the membership into getting involved with interesting projects which could benefit the membership as a whole as well as anyone interested in Family History. We also require volunteers to help run the office in Winchester to fill roles such as Research Manager, Office Manager, Sales Manager and Stock Controller.

We are developing our processes to enable a standard for transcribing by our volunteers.

The Society will continue to develop Succession Planning to enable the Society to manage any unforeseen situations.

We shall increase the amount of information available to members in the Members' Area. Some information will be offered free to encourage non-members to join.

We shall build a relationship with the u3a as they have their own family history sections.

We shall be investigating alternative media to CDs to store and sell our data on.

We shall look at the possibility of reinstating the Christchurch and New Milton, Portsmouth and Southampton Groups.

We are planning for the celebration of our 50th Anniversary in 2024.

We will have a display in the HRO foyer in January & February 2023 showcasing the activities of HGS.

### STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

#### Governing document

The Hampshire Genealogical Society is governed by its Constitution, which was adopted on 17 April 1982 and was amended on 8 November 1992, 28 March 1998, 23 September 2000, 9 May 2010, 26 September 2010, 12 October 2014, 16 June 2018 and 10 October 2020.

Election of Trustees takes place annually at the AGM by the members of the Society. Names are proposed and seconded before the election. No other person or body is entitled to appoint a Trustee.

### STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

### Structure and management

The Hampshire Genealogical Society is a county interest group affiliated to the Family History Federation (FHF). The FHF provides training conferences, written material and access to shared experience which assists and helps to train Trustees. The accountants provide training seminars to the Treasurer, Secretary and Chairman.

Trustees attend an Executive Committee meeting six times per year (i.e. every two months) at which policy, finance, development work, plans and performance are reviewed.

Within the Society there are currently ten local groups spread across the county which meet on a monthly basis to provide information, education and assistance to members. An International Group started in February 2021 has now been complemented with the National Group which started in January 2022. Group Organisers attend a Development Forum meeting three times a year together with other post holders within the society. This enables Trustees' decisions from Executive Committee meetings to be formally fed back and for the Forum members to discuss and raise issues for consideration at the next Executive Committee meeting.

#### Risk management

The Trustees have a duty to identify and review the risks to which the charity is exposed and to ensure appropriate controls are in place to provide reasonable assurance against fraud and error.

#### Changes to the Society

Elaine Boyes stood down as a Trustee at the 2022 AGM.

#### NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2022

### 1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

### Basis of preparing the financial statements

The financial statements of the charity, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019)', Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland' and the Charities Act 2011. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

The trustees consider that there are no material uncertainties about the charity's ability to continue as a going concern.

#### Income

All income is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities once the charity has entitlement to the funds, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

#### Expenditure

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

## **Tangible fixed assets**

Depreciation is provided at the following annual rates in order to write off each asset over its estimated useful life.

Office Equipment -25% on cost Fixtures and fittings -25% on cost Computer Equipment -25% on cost

Individual fixed assets costing £250 or more are capitalised at cost.

#### **Stocks**

Stocks are valued at the lower of cost and net realisable value, after making due allowance for obsolete and slow moving items.

#### **Taxation**

The charity is exempt from tax on its charitable activities.

## Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees.

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the notes to the financial statements.

#### **Financial instruments**

The charity only enters into basic financial instruments transactions that result in the recognition of financial assets and liabilities like trade and other accounts receivable and payable, loans from banks and other third parties and loans to related parties and investments in non-puttable ordinary shares.

### 1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES - continued

#### Financial instruments

#### Trade and other debtors

Short term debtors are measured at transaction price, less any impairment. Loans receivable are measured initially at fair value, net of transaction costs, and are measured subsequently at amortised cost using the effective interest method, less any impairment.

#### Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents comprise cash at bank and on hand, deposits with banks and other short-term highly liquid investments and bank overdrafts. In the balance sheet, bank overdrafts are shown within borrowings or current liabilities.

#### Trade and other creditors

Short term trade creditors are measured at the transaction price. Other financial liabilities, including bank loans, are measured initially at fair value, net of transaction costs, and are measured subsequently at amortised cost using the effective interest method.
