Routes of Roots in Multiple Diasporas: An Autobiographical DNA Journey by Melsia Tomlin-Kräftner



This presentation explores a journey through the multiple human geographical movement of people in my ancestry, from various diasporas, who settled in Jamaica, during the British colonial period.

This eclectic mix of diasporic people created a Jamaican society, who have their national motto as 'Out of Many, One People'.

Dr Melsia Tomlin-Kräftner is currently a Lecturer in Management, teaching various topics, and specialises in Management Research Methods and Gendered studies in the University of Bristol, Business School.

Previously, as a Sociologist, she was a Lecturer in Criminology & Policing, and with over twenty-five years of Caribbean genealogical study of the various diasporas, Melsia's research focuses on race, gender, class, and colourism, as it relates to mixed-heritage people in the British colonial pre-post slavery emancipation period.

Disciplines of human geography, sociology, anthropology, criminology, psychology, consumer behaviour, and management intersect to explore decoloniality, and the multiple diasporic movements that shaped Caribbean people's lives.
